Subject Specific Vocabulary	
clay	Clay is a naturally occurring sticky fine grained earth. It can be moulded into different shapes. Clay is used to make bricks, potteries, and ceramics. It is also used to make sculptures and decorative patterns and designs.
form	A solid shape has form, it is not flat.
sculpture	An artistic object created in 3 dimensions.
roll	Pressing down on a material to flatten it.
knead	Pressing, folding, stretching.
texture	How a surface feels to the touch.
join	Join two pieces of clay with the score and slip technique.

- Use sketchbooks to collect and record visual information from different sources. Use the sketch book to plan how to join parts of the sculpture. Annotate work in sketchbook.
